


Writing to discuss....

Day/Activity 1: Writing to Discuss

Writing to discuss means that you are discussing a topic. If there are multiple sides to the discussion, try to evenly represent both sides.



Features of Writing to Discuss

The most important part of writing to discuss is being clear about the point you are discussing. To do this effectively, you'll need to use a range of different features.

Balanced Argument

Should Animals Be Kept in Zoos?



In the UK alone, there are more than 400 zoos. These house animals from chickens and sheep to critically endangered wildlife but how ethical are they? Should animals be kept in zoos or should they be left in the wild? One of the strongest arguments against keeping animals in zoos is that keeping an animal in captivity stops it from being able to exhibit natural behaviours. For example, in the wild, a lion's territory can cover up to 400 square kilometres; something that is impossible to replicate within a zoo.



However, when considering the viability of zoos, there is a strong argument for them on conservation grounds. Today, there are animals housed in zoos which are entirely extinct in the wild.



Five Ducks and a Cat Review

With the official release of Brynn Baum's latest masterpiece only days away, I was offered the opportunity to attend an early viewing. Being a huge fan of Baum's films, which have been entertaining generations for nearly two decades now, I jumped at the opportunity. Interestingly, the film opens with the same musical piece that ended Baum's first film, 'Two Geese and a Kettle'.


I don't feel as though this was meant as a statement although several people believe that this could be a subtle hint at Baum's retirement from the film industry. Here's hoping they might be wrong.

Like all of Baum's films, 'Five Ducks and a Cat' is poignant, heartwarming and makes clear points about the issues currently facing society. Mallard's honest portrayal of Duck Three is mesmerising, making it hard to believe that this is their first feature-length film.



Although others may disagree, the mere three hours that the film lasted just didn't seem to be long enough for the complex storyline to reach a full conclusion. Should School Summer Holidays Be Shorter?

Day/Activity 3: Planning your own discussion text

Day/Activity 3: Planning your own discussion text

...Collect arguments both for and against returning...you can make notes in whichever way you prefer, two columns, for and against, a spider diagram or randomly presented bullet points.

...Try to make sure you have a balance of arguments on both sides (you know all of this from when we were at school!)

...You might also want to think about how you will introduce the subject of the discussion...more on that in the next activity.

Day/activity 4: Planning your discussion....

I have provided a writing frame for you to plan out your first draft of the discussion.

- It has space for an introduction, arguments for with evidence, arguments against with evidence and a conclusion.
- Remember to use the features you have looked at in the last few activities...use the examples as templates.
- You are sure to have personal feelings about this subject, do you want to sound too biased? Maybe, but give both sides.

Day/Activity 5: Write up your final discussion

The final task is to check your first draft, read it through, read to a family member and see what they would change.

- You are now ready to write your final draft and produce the finished piece of work.
- But that does not have to be the end...could YOU be the next Stacey Dooley or Louis Theroux? Why not rehearse reading your discussion text and then film yourself to make your own short documentary news clip.
- ...Or maybe you would rather make it into an online magazine article using Powerpoint or similar with pictures and hyperlinks to relevant websites etc....I can't wait to see how you present it.
